Saturday 7th October

Guided walk: 'Bare Ruin'd Choirs'

The Story of Hyde Abbey from Foundation to Dissolution

Meet in the abbey gateway, King Alfred Place, at 2:30pm

Following on from previous guided walks, this new tour explains not only the location of the abbey buildings, but also more of the abbey area's sometimes troubled history, both pre and post dissolution. This includes the 2013 Unmarked Grave project as televised on BBC2, and the background to the dramatic community dig findings that will be revealed on 20th October during the King Alfred weekend.

Guided walk: 'Breaking the Rule'

Monkish Misconduct in Hyde Abbey

Meet in the abbey gateway, King Alfred Place, at 2:30pm

As well as touring the abbey site, the walk includes a fascinating insight into a part of abbey life that is quite different from the usual, expected, fairly austere round of quiet devotion, prayer and study. Included in this tour is the story of Hyde Abbey fighting against the bishop as they took different sides in the civil war for the throne between William the Conqueror's quarrelling grandchildren, Stephen and Matilda. Hear how later, at least two future bishops were officially to admonish the abbots for their monks' decidedly un-pious behaviour! Learn too how the monks were repeatedly in trouble for breaking the monastic rules and how one abbot was even paid to stay away from the abbey.

Friday 13th October

English Language Day

The Making of English in India

Stripe Theatre, University of Winchester, 6pm

The English Project's annual lecture to celebrate English Language Day will be delivered by David Graddol, celebrated linguist and expert on English in India and China. 2017 is the India-UK Year of Culture.

The East India Company arrived at Surat in India in 1607. David will explore the role it played in expanding the use of English in India, focusing especially on events leading up to the infamous Macaulay's Minute in 1835, regarded by many Indians today as the moment English was 'imposed' on the country. The historic evidence suggests a story which is much more




complex, involving many public figures of the time, and which provides interesting parallels to the rise of English in corporate India today.

David Graddol is an acclaimed linguist perhaps best known for his ground-breaking 1997 book *The future of English?*, published by the British Council, in which he offered a number of compelling scenarios for how English as a world language might develop. Most notably, he pointed out that native speakers of English are, or will soon be, outnumbered by those who speak English as a second or foreign language.

While rooted in the history of the East India Company, David's lecture will stimulate a contemporary conversation about the continuing story of English in India today, a fitting celebration of the Anglo-Indian cultural collaboration in 2017.

Hyde Soldiers 1917 - 2017

As we have done for the past 3 years, we will be commemorating those soldiers who died in 1917. In addition to memorialising by name each individual fatality, we shall be reflecting on how the war affected the lives of local people and those who went away to fight and, too often, to die.

As local resident General Sir Antony Walker says, 'In 1917, on the front line, casualties continued to mount and at home privations made an increasing impact on everyday lives. But all was not doom and gloom. The seeds of ultimate success began to show even in this darkest year.'

Following a programme of music and poetry commemorating the era, led by Sir Antony, the event will conclude with a reading of the roll-call of the 1917 casualties. The modern day occupiers of their former homes are then invited to add their flags to the Hyde Soldiers commemorative map.




Professor Simon Keynes

Tours of the garden by Friends of Hyde Abbey Garden, including a display explaining the history of the site and the founding of the garden.

Following a five year long Community Archaeological dig on the present Hyde



Abbey Garden site, led by Winchester City Council archaeologists, the site was to have been covered over.

But local resident Barbara Hall (now president of Hyde Abbey Garden) gathered support from local residents and other volunteers and, with the help of the Hampshire Garden Trust and agreement from the City Council, Hyde Abbey Garden came into being.

The Association of Hyde Abbey Garden was officially inaugurated in February 2002 with charitable status, and the City Council made the garden its Golden Jubilee Project.

Renowned garden designer Kim Wilkie conceived the plan of the garden, construction commenced on 27th March 2003 and the first stage was opened by Lord Lieutenant Mary Fagan on 2nd June 2003. Alan Titchmarsh switched on the lights on 22nd October 2007.

The garden is very much part of the community: a lovely place to sit in relative peace. It is maintained by a very hard-working group of volunteers.


As the creative arm of *Hyde Abbey: the Lost Minster of Alfred the Great*, Hyde900 Project Space 2017 in the Darch Room offers artworks and events from bursary-awarded artists responding to the story of Hyde Abbey and its relevance today.

For the Autumn and final stage: Fionn Duffy explores King Alfred's psalm translations and found-sounds in the abbey precinct; Eileen White and Noriko Suzuki-Bosco reference Winchester Style illuminated manuscripts to tell local residents' hidden stories through the artist's book form; Sonia Barrett marries the ubiquitous 'selfie' with the abbey's stained glass window illumination and invites residents to produce a collaborative, collective portrait; and Cherng-Min Teong, Will Fairbrother and Alberto Ruiz Soler undertake a modern-day walking pilgrimage across Southern England and Northern France, exploring how the physical might transform the spiritual.
